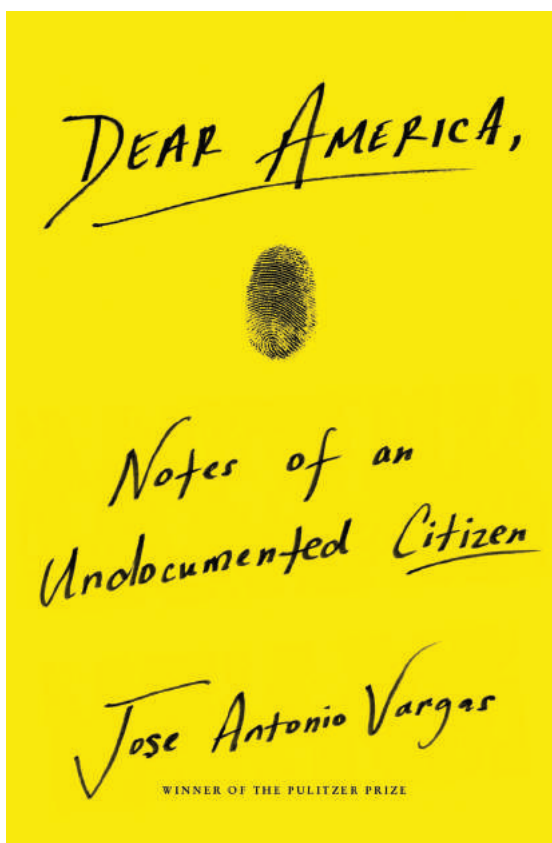


WASHTENAW READS: A CITIZEN'S SEARCH FOR HOME

Every year, Washtenaw County libraries and patrons gather to promote reading and civic dialogue through the shared experience of a common book.

For 2020, the selection is author Jose Antonio Vargas's *Dear America: Notes of an Undocumented Citizen*. This moving memoir details the hardships that Vargas and over 11 million other undocumented immigrants face when trying to adapt to a new culture and status in the United States.

At the age of 12, Vargas was sent to America from the Philippines to live with his maternal grandparents. Immediately he was faced with the unsettling challenge of lying and hiding from the government, in fear of arrest and deportation. Common tasks such as applying for college or obtaining a driver's license forced him to use fake papers. Vargas knew that without documentation, his opportunities were limited. To this day, he remains undocumented.

His best-selling memoir, *Dear America: Notes of an Undocumented Citizen*, was published by HarperCollins in 2018. STAND UP AND BE COUNTED

Every 10 years, the US Census Bureau conducts a count of all persons living in the country to gain critical information that impacts political representation, federal funding, and more. In 2010, Ypsilanti's population was one of the most undercounted in the state, which has resulted in the underfunding of social services, community infrastructure, and economic development. This year, the community is working to ensure that every person knows the importance of the Census to the Ypsilanti area and feels empowered to complete it in the spring.

The Importance of the Census to the Ypsilanti Community

The Decennial Census has a real impact on daily life in Ypsilanti and Washtenaw County. The results of the Census determine political representation at the national, state, and local levels. Michigan's seats in the US House of Representatives could decrease based on the results of the 2020 Census. It also is used to allocate billions of dollars of federal funding, with each additional individual who takes the Census representing approximately \$1,800 in annual dollars used to support our roads, community infrastructure projects, and social service programs. The Census is also used to plan development in communities, attract businesses, and improve public transportation. These are just a few of the reasons an accurate count is so important to the Ypsilanti community.

How to Take the Census

By April 1, 2020, every household will receive an invitation to respond to the Census online or over the phone. In some cases, households will still receive a paper form. The individual who completes the Census will do so for every member of the household, answering the following

questions:

1. The number of people living or staying at your home, and the name of each person.
2. Whether the home is owned or rented.
3. The sex of each person in the household.
4. The age of each person in the household.
5. The race of each person in the household.
6. Whether a person in the household is of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin.
7. The relationship of each person in the household to each other.

All individuals should answer based on where their primary residence is on April 1, 2020. This includes college students who spend a majority of the year living in Ypsilanti, as well as residents who may be on vacation during the late winter/early spring. The Census is completely confidential. No one will be able to look at your individual Census record. For example, if you live in a house with someone who is not legally allowed to live there, you can include them in your answers and your landlord will not find out.

Need Help?

During Count Week, libraries, nonprofit agencies, and businesses will be reserving computers for members of the public to complete the Census with volunteers available to help answer questions. Census events at churches, clubs, and other venues will allow community members to come together to take the Census. Dates and locations will be posted on washtenaw.org/Census2020 in the coming months. YDL is also offering dedicated computers and staff assistance to participate in the Census. CENSUS HELP

For the first time, the Census will be conducted primarily online. During Count Week (Mar 22–28), all three YDL locations will have dedicated computers for your participation in the 2020 Census. No library card is needed.

Staff is always available to help you. During the computer training lab hours, staff can sit with you upon request to help navigate the form.

FREE TAX ASSISTANCE EXPANDING

For the first time, free income tax return assistance will be offered at all YDL locations! Federal and Michigan 1040 forms will be submitted electronically and you will receive a paper copy of your return to take home.

For the second year, **YDL-Superior** will serve as a **Scan & Go tax preparation site**, in partnership with United Way of Washtenaw County and the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. Trained and certified library staff scan your documentation and upload it to a secure United Way tax website. Tax-certified United Way volunteers then complete your taxes. Once your taxes are complete, the volunteer contacts you to arrange another appointment, where you'll review and sign. After that second appointment, your taxes are filed electronically. To be eligible for the Scan & Go service, your income should be under \$56,000. All **Scan & Go sessions** are made by appointment, either by calling **YDL-Superior** at 734-482-4110, x1310 or by registering at www.uwwashtenaw.org/freetaxhelp.

AARP Foundation Tax-Aide volunteers have been doing taxes at YDL-Michigan, at no cost, for over 12 years, completing the taxes of hundreds of taxpayers annually. This year, AARP will also do taxes at YDL-Whittaker. AARP's Tax-Aide assistance program is provided by trained volunteers in partnership with the IRS. AARP's tax preparation is targeted at low- and moderate-income taxpayers. There is no age requirement, but this service especially targets those over 50 years old. AARP membership is not required. Call 734-482-4110, x2411 or x2421 to make an AARP Tax-Aide appointment or for more information.

CALLING ALL COMMISSIONERS

If the 2020 Census has started you thinking about how government works and wanting to participate, you're in luck! The City of Ypsilanti has several boards, commissions, and committees that you can volunteer to serve on—no election needed. These boards, commissions, and committees generally advise City Council in specific areas, such as the arts, sustainability, social issues, long-range planning, and others.

Some can also review ordinance changes or make decisions on applications. The City also appoints resident delegates to certain regional committees to represent the City's viewpoint and goals on regional issues. The City has more than 10 of its own boards and commissions, and is represented on at least three regional bodies. In other words, when engaged citizens participate on these boards, the community benefits!

THE FIRST RULE OF PUNK: BE YOURSELF

This season's Family Read pick is 2018 Pura Belpré Author Honor Book *The First Rule of Punk*, by Celia C. Pérez. Maria Luisa, known to friends and family as Malú, loves punk rock, skateboarding, zines, and Soyrizo (but not cilantro). When her college-professor mom takes a new job, they move thousands of miles from her music-loving dad, who reminds her that everything will be OK as long as she remembers the first rule of punk: be yourself. She learns more about her Mexican heritage and Chicana influences on her favorite music genre from her new neighbors, and eventually forms a band that auditions for the school talent show. But will the anti-punk school administration choose them to

perform?

There will be plenty of chances to engage with the book at the library. Kids can read the book together, chat, try food from the story, and make art at weekly YDL-Superior and YDL-Whittaker Tween Reading Circles. Readers of all ages are invited to make zines at the Ypsi Writes Zine writing 24-hour Challenge. Kids can explore the traditional art of the Otomi and make Frida Kahlo inspired miniature shadow boxes at art workshops, plus learn to make tamales, friendship bracelets, and more. At the final celebration, everyone is invited to the library for Mexican treats, hands-on art stations, and to hear mariachi punk.

Collage art zines are scattered throughout the book, pulling the reader through the story visually, making it feel like a graphic novel. Because the Family Read was designed to encourage families to unplug and read aloud together, there are many great conversation starters. *The First Rule of Punk* touches on themes such as standing up for your right to express yourself, discovering your own identity and culture, fitting in at school, and that everyone's voice counts.

The books we choose are appropriate for kids



as young as 3rd grade but interesting enough for adults. Go to ypsilibrary.org for our complementary booklist for younger readers so everyone can be part of the fun.



COME TO THE "WRITE" PLACE: YPSI WRITES NOW OPEN

Did you ever think about talking with someone about your writing? Try Ypsi Writes, a community writing center located at all three YDL locations. Trained writing tutors are available for drop-in hours where you can bring in a piece of writing, an idea for a piece of writing, or just questions about writing in general. The tutors can help you:

- Get started with your writing
- Address your audience
- Revise and polish your writing
- Try different genres—from resumes to novels to poetry to memoirs to blogs

Ypsi Writes is a partnership among three organizations devoted to promoting reading and writing: Eastern Michigan University's Office of Campus and Community Writing, 826michigan (the youth writing and tutoring program), and YDL. Its goal is to help writers of all ages and abilities discover their writing selves and share the joy of writing.

In addition to tutoring, Ypsi Writes offers evening and weekend workshops: some for adults, some for teens, some for children, and some for all ages together.

"We believe everyone is a writer," says Ann Blakeslee, director of EMU's Office of Campus and Community Writing and co-founder of Ypsi Writes. "In collaboration with 826michigan and YDL, we are committed to helping all Ypsilanti residents enjoy and experience the benefits of writing."

TRY OUR NEW SENSORY KITS

Since 2017, YDL has circulated kits with simple tools for caregivers to use with kids experiencing life with autism spectrum disorder, as well as two balance boards that help with sensory integration. Now, we are expanding our collection of Sensory Kits. In addition to toys and tools that support specific skill development, each kit will contain four picture books caregivers can read aloud with kids. New kits that are already circulating include fidgets, speech therapy tools, and toys that develop fine motor skills. As we expand our Library of Things this year, watch for more kits with materials that:

- Develop gross motor skills and self-esteem
- Assist with visual impairment
- Teach baby sign language
- Help you engage in hands-on stories
- Help a child who is experiencing anxiety calm down.

Along with these new kits, YDL is supporting a three-part series hosted by Landria Seals Green, a Board Certified Behavior Analyst and speech language pathologist. The series will be held on Tuesday evenings beginning January 14, at 6:30 pm (details on page 9). Ms. Green is the President and CCO of Momentum Autism Therapy and Momentum Therapy Network, and is also the founder and Chief Knowledge Office of SOAR Solutions for Autism, ABA, and Special Education. Topics for caregivers of children experiencing life with autism spectrum disorder will include toilet training and bedtime routines.

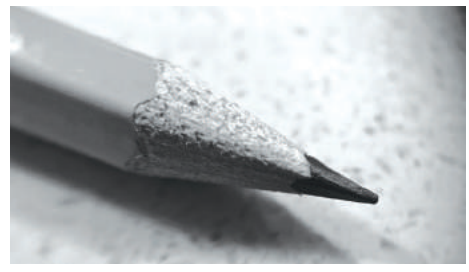

The new structure will be ADA accessible with the installation of a 6' wide sidewalk leading up

to the equipment. The total playground area will increase to approximately 2,500 square feet.

Prevent Flu: Get a Flu Shot and Wash Your Hands

Winter means flu season. The Washtenaw County Health Department urges everyone six months and older to get vaccinated against the flu. We don't know how bad the season will be, but we know vaccination, good handwashing, covering your cough, and staying away from others when sick can prevent the spread of flu.

Flu is a contagious illness that can be spread person to person through droplets when an infected person sneezes, coughs, or talks.

Symptoms of the flu include coughing, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, sore throat, headache, fatigue, fever, and chills. The flu can affect anyone, but older adults, children, and individuals with chronic health conditions are at greater risk for complications.

Vaccination can protect you against severe illness, hospitalization, or death due to flu. Getting vaccinated also protects the people around you, who may be more likely to get seriously ill from flu. 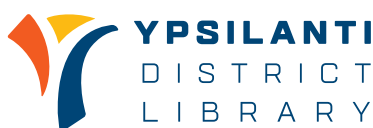
