#### To Participate:


- Register by contacting Joy: 734-732-2634 (cell), joy@ypsilibrary.org.




# Neon Social Justice Poster Kit and Tips

#### Included in your Neon Poster Kit:

- 4 sheets of 11 x 17 cardstock
- 7 sheets of UV reactive colored paper
- Set of neon colored pencils
- Set of neon gel pens
- 7 highlighters
- Permanent marker
- Mechanical pencil
- Glue stick
- Pencil sharpener
- · Mini black light
- A labeled bag to send your poster to YDL-Michigan for display

#### Tips for Working with Neon Poster Kit

- Neon colors are "UVA reactive". Under a low spectrum ultraviolet light, they glow more than the other colors around them. What we call "black light" is actually a light with a UVA coating to make fluorescent neon colors react.
- Test your colors by scribbling on a scrap of paper and see how the colors look when you
  shine your mini black light on the paper while in a dark room. Not all neon colors react to UV
  black lighting the same. Fluorescent green, pink, yellow, and orange are the safest bets. Blues
  and purples tend to show up less than other neon colors.
- **Draw out your concept in pencil** first so you can erase and change your ideas.
- **Use the neon paper to cut out shapes** or give dramatic effect to your design. Use glue stick to make sure they stay down. Once you bring your poster in for display, it will be laminated and the shapes will stay down permanently.
- Keep your poster clean by putting it back in the bag each time after you work on it.
- **Use things from home** such as other highlighters, gel pens, tapes, packaging, and other things that might glow when they are under black light. Test them to see if they are UV reactive by shining your mini black light on them in a dark room.

# Social Justice and Gathering Ideas

#### What is social justice?

**Social justice** is the concept of fair and just relationships between an individual and our society. **Injustice** is unfair treatment to individuals based on their race, ethnicity, gender, orientation, age, abilities, religion, or appearance. **Denying equal access** to education, housing, jobs, health care, access to food, fair policing, etc., is unjust.

#### Gathering ideas for your poster

- Think about social justice or injustices that you've seen, been a victim of, heard about in a book, TV, or on the internet. What moved you about those situations? What words or images come to your mind?
- Here are some prompts that may help:
  - What does fairness look like? What does equity look like? What does justice look like?
  - What would people do, think, or say if they were being fair? Unfair?
  - Fill in this question:
     What would (school, playgrounds, work, family, birthday parties,
     neighborhoods, hospitals, prisons, America, the world) look like with out (racism, injustice, stereotypes, global warming, waste, poverty, vi olence, health inequities)? What words or images would you use to
     show this idea?
- What icons for social justice have you seen? How can you modify them to make them yours?
- Look up images and words on the internet and in books to inspire your own ideas.

# Creating YOUR Social Justice Poster

#### **Visible**

Think LARGE when making your poster. Make words and images big so they fill up the entire page. Posters are made to attract attention so they must be visible from a far away.

#### **Using Only Words**

When using words only in your poster, make sure your letters are legible, and large. Fill up the poster with your thoughts! If you want to write a short poem, make the words large enough for readers to read from outside the library.

#### **Using Only Images**


When using images, you can use other images to help you with your drawing, if needed. What does your image say? What message do the colors give?
